Our programs have evolved and expanded over the years, and we've more than doubled our manufacturing facility this past year. Our first house was a small sanctuary in East Nashville where five women in 1997 were welcomed home. By 2003, we had secured Nashville's first permit for a group home in a residential neighborhood and four homes hosted 20 beds where women could begin their journey.

The guiding principles were simple: no cost to the participant, 2-years of housing and healing, with no authority living in the house. Residents were accountable for themselves and to one another, creating a supportive environment to foster sisterhood and healing.

I've been here for two years and we've grown so much in that time. I'm excited to see how many more lives we'll touch in the next 25 years and I want to continue growing and be a part of this growth. As long as I feel healthy and I feel safe, I'll be right here to help and do whatever I'm able to do.

25 years and 156 resilient Thistle Farms graduates later, we now host 32 beds in 6 homes in Nashville. The most recent home opened Summer 2022 and was named Cato House in honor of Hal Cato, who departed Thistle Farms after 6 years as CEO.

In addition to our residential homes, in 2020 we opened the first safe house in Middle Tennessee with four beds dedicated to helping trafficking survivors find short-term, emergency housing. During each woman's stay, we work to find long-term resources to continue her healing journey.

In 2011, Eden House in New Orleans became our first sister organization in what would become the Thistle National Network. After welcoming its first resident in 2012, Eden House has housed more than 67 residents and assisted over 400 clients. The program addresses the Greater New Orleans area's epidemic of human trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation for all races and ages.

Today, Thistle Farms hosts the largest network in the United States committed to a housing-first model for survivors. In March, we hosted more than 300 world changers at our National Conference where together we learned more about public policy, outreach, and social enterprises.

In 2001, we started our first social enterprise, creating a path for residents to gain financial independence while still on their healing journey. It all began in a 750 square foot parish basement with borrowed pots and shared recipes for essential oils, candles, and balms. The products were made with intention by women whose bodies had not been their own as a way to reclaim and heal.

St. Augustine's Chapel and St. George's served as our first 'manufacturing centers' as we explored what it meant to create sustainable income for our mission and residents.

Since those early days, we've grown exponentially. In 2010, the gift of our current space on Charlotte Avenue allowed us to move operations into a 3,000 square foot facility where we could employ 25 women and welcome a number of volunteers as we poured candles and made paper out of dried flowers. Just a few years later, we moved into a nearby 7,500 square foot facility and grew our line to 83 different products, including soaps, lotions, room sprays, and more.

While that facility was meant to last us 10 years, we quickly outgrew the space after only five years and needed to move again. Our new manufacturing and logistics center in West Nashville more than doubled our space, bringing us to 22,000+ square feet.

Global Shared Trade

In 2014, our social enterprises expanded to address sexual exploitation, trafficking, and extreme poverty on a global scale through an aligned network of artisan enterprises supporting women's dignity and economic opportunity, and community programming.

Our first global partner, Ikirezi in Rwanda, produces organic essential oils from some of the fields where the 1994 genocide took place. Working primarily with widows and adult orphans from the genocide, Ikirezi uses holistic efforts to restore dignity and rebuild communities. Ikirezi is our sourcing partner for the geranium oil used in our best-selling Essential Oil Bug Spray.

Our Global Shared Trade partners now tally 39, spanning 21 countries and supporting 1,400 artisans through product sales and small business development.

One of our newest partners is Colectivo 1050° in Oaxaca, Mexico, elevating the symbolic, cultural, and commercial value of pottery. With the renewed revenue from this ancient craft, women in Oaxaca are spinning clay from the earth into revenue to build schools, change laws, and overcome the gang violence of their community.

The Cafe is a tangible sign of the deeper meaning of healing, hospitality, and the honor of serving others. So we knew that if we wanted to welcome the community, we needed to feed them. In 2013, we opened the Thistle Stop Café. Without a kitchen to start, we served a limited menu with the help of various local catering partnerships. Stage for performances on Thistle Thursdays for singersongwriters included acts such as the Indigo Girls, Reba McIntyre, and Kelly Clarkson.

The Café became a way to welcome donors, volunteers, and supporters who were making their way to Thistle Farms from far and near, and to extend the reach of our social enterprises.

In 1997, Becca Stevens and a dedicated group of volunteers worked to bring the vision of a healing community for women in need of understanding, safety, and recovery to life. Throughout those early handto-mouth years for the organization, volunteers and later staff navigated a number of challenges to build the business: wearing multiple hats, borrowing computers, and providing rides to women in the program to access basic needs like a doctor's appointment or the grocery store. Four of those volunteers - Holly Anglin, Marlei Olson, Sherri Roddick, and Stacye Wilson - are still on staff today, having played a pivotal role in helping to build Thistle Farms from the ground up.

Our very first fundraiser took place in 1998 in Becca's living room, where we wrapped Christmas presents for others for a \$25 donation.

The next year, we held our first real fundraiser in the lobby of a Brentwood hotel with musical guests Marcus Hummon, Matraca Berg, and Marshall Chapman. Hundreds of people heard the love story firsthand and started spreading the word.

A new tradition was born that has served us well ever since.

The event grew from being held in hotel lobbies and on Vanderbilt's campus to sold out shows at the Ryman.
